What is this course about?

This course offers students an opportunity to work in clay whilst studying directly from the life model; combining modelling skills and creativity with anatomical knowledge. Suitable for both beginners and more experienced sculptors, this 10 week course will enable students to sculpt the full figure on a half-life scale.

Through learning various techniques in observation, measurement and plumbing, students will understand the essentials of construction as well as the importance of capturing gesture and proportion. More advanced students will have the opportunity to push in a more personal direction; with the potential to produce larger scaled and more specific work, such as a torso.

By the end of this course you will:

Have completed at least one figurative piece in clay and gained skills in the following:

About your tutor

Laura Postle is a classically trained figurative sculptor who is a graduate of the Florence academy of art, Italy. Based on observation of the human figure her work pushes to explores the true character of her model whilst accentuating gesture and capturing the emotion of her subject.

Below are some aspects of what topics will be covered in the course. If a student wishes to follow their own approach, the tutor will respond to their needs and work with them individually.

Armature making: Students will be taught how to build strong and flexible armatures on a half life scale.

Capturing gesture and proportion: From the outset students will be encouraged to capture the model's individuality and character in pose.

Anatomy: Key points and planes will be explained to ensure structural credibility as well as develop anatomical knowledge.

Measurement, scaling and plumbing: Measuring techniques such as the 'scale of proportions' and 'comparative measurements' will be taught to assist students in capturing a true likeness.

Observation: Practical methods and tricks to train the eye will be given to gain a fresh perspective and enable confidence without relying too heavily on external critique.

Modelling skills: Light and shadow will be used as an aid to capture 3-dimensional form and create subtle transitions and half tones.

Texture and Clay application: Becoming familiar with clay through experimentation and using various tools, students will develop individual styles and surfaces to their work.

Creative development: Creative support will be given to enable students to portray the figure in their chosen way. Focal points within the piece will be encouraged.

Course Times

10 - 5pm: The final 15 minutes of each class will be a group clean up after your day's work, ensuring the studio is left tidy for the evening classes that follow.

Weekly breakdown

Courses at the Art Academy offer a structured approach to ensure specific subjects, skills and methods are covered. Below is a weekly breakdown of what will be covered. Bear in mind that these classes will move with the pace of the class so a degree of flexibility of what will be covered on which day will be employed. It is useful to bring all tools to each class, even though some classes will use more specific tools than others. If anyone wishes to draw there will b equipment available to do so.

Preparation Requirements

Diploma and Certificate Students you must bring your own sculpture tools and equipment. Part Timers can use The Art Academy's tools if necessary. You need all the basic modeling equipment laid out in the student handbook

Drawing equipment - (pencils, charcoal, rubber, board clips) and a sketchbook.

Tiranti modeling tools Modeling tools - b5 / 6 / 7 / 8/10 - SF stainless steel-BM11 - No 46 (available generally also from our shop)

Plumb-line

2 x G clamps 8"

Snub-nosed pliers (i.e. the normal ones) Snips, Tape measure, Hammer

Sketchpad and pencil (for note-taking)

Long matchsticks/ or cocktail sticks

Calipers (ideally medium-sized Tiranti aliminium calipers. Well worth the £29.30 investment for anyone serious about modeling, will last a lifetime. Can be bought in AA shop)

Dividers (like compasses but with two points)

Untextured rags for wrapping (bedsheets are really good)

Thin plastic sheeting for wrapping, Clothes pegs or masking tape for wrapping

Aluminium [ali] wire

Jubilee clips, screw and staple selection, mixed drill bit set

Copper wire - (available generally also from our shop)

Plastilene - (available generally also from our shop)

Additional Costs

Larger pieces such as a torso may require further clay at an additional cost. One bag per student is provided.

Generally wire armatures will be used inside the sculptures; therefore pieces can not be fired. If students want to keep their work, it generally needs to be moulded and cast, please see the moulding document, which gives all the different options for achieving this.

If pieces are made in clay and do not have armatures in them, It is possible to fire them This is optional and additional firing costs will apply.

- £15 for a small figure
- £20 for a portrait head
- £20 for a large figure

Hollowing is necessary before pieces can be fired. Should students prefer to maximise their modelling experience, they can arrange with the tutor to have their piece hollowed for an additional fee. The cost for hollowing is £20 for a head or large figure, £15 for a small figure.

Moulding & Casting Overview 2016 - 2017

There are two main types of mould:

- Waste mould: plaster, only one cast can be taken as the mould is destroyed in process.
- Reusable mould: silicon rubber, can be used to take multiple sculpture casts out up to approx. 20 times.

There are two main types of cast.

- Plaster / cement cast.
- Resin with stone or metal filler cast.

Time required for a standing figure 750mm tall (approximately):

Plaster waste mould - 2 days

Reusable rubber mould - 3 days

Plaster cast - 2 days (one day for casting, one day for finishing)

Resin cast with metal or stone filler - 2 days (one day for casting, one day for finishing)


