What is this course about?

If you are interested in learning to sculpt the human figure then this is an ideal class for you. You have the opportunity to explore both the full figure and a portrait head sculpture with a different model for each. You will model in clay for 10 weeks: 5 weeks of Figure Sculpture from a set pose and 5 weeks of Portrait Head Sculpture from a different model.

You will get a flavour of the challenges and thrills of both of these disciplines. Many come back term after term to deepen their understanding - beginners are welcome. As well as the practice and development of working in clay from a model, also covered are measuring skills, observational skills and discuss preparation of a piece for firing. Optional hollowing and firing of the clay sculptures are an additional cost.

What topics do we cover?

- Basic understanding of sculptural techniques, tools and management of working in clay
- Observation and measuring skills working from a life model for a figure and a portrait sculpture
- Develop modelling skills and work towards a personal interpretation of the model

By the end of this course you will: have made a figure sculpture in clay, a portrait sculpture in clay and will have gained and developed a basic understanding of working from a life model.

What level is the course and do I need any particular skills?

This course is ideal for beginners, although intermediate level students are also welcome, as this course also builds on existing skills.

How will I be taught, and what feedback and support will I get?

Your experienced tutor will support you throughout the course in both group sessions and one-to-one support providing regular feedback, critique and constructive advice. Each course ends in a final round up session and should you wish for any specific feedback or support, please speak with your tutor at the start of your course.

When I've finished, what course can I do next?

There are a variety of courses available as short courses over the Easter and the Summer

holidays, also a wide range of evening classes, such as creative sculpture, stone carving, ceramics, figure sculpture etc.

If you have more time available huge development can be made in your practice by attending one of our part time day classes in sculpture or the sculpture certificate programme. Please see all the options available on our web site.

Are there any other costs? What else should I bring each lesson?

Most equipment and materials are provided but depending on your chosen creative approach in the latter part of the course, you may need to source some materials yourself, also bring your own sketchbook if you have one.

If you work in clay without an armature, you will be offered the opportunity to have your clay pieces fired. This is optional and additional hollowing and firing costs will apply. Hollowing is necessary before a piece can be fired.

Daily breakdown


