What is this course about?

Primarily a practical course. You will gain a structured understanding of stone as a material, learn basic carving techniques and discover ways of being creative with this wonderful medium. Through practising all of these aspects, they will come together in the creation of your finished piece of work. Initial sketches, pictures and ideas are looked at and a small clay model will be produced as a visual aid for the stone carving. Individual discussions of your ideas will take place, you will then be shown how to transfer these initial ideas onto a stone block prior to carving.

Please note that there is an additional fee for initial purchase of stone, which varies depending on the type of stone you wish to use. Art Academy staff are able to advise ahead of booking.

What topics do we cover?

- Learn basic stone carving techniques and knowledge of tools
- Apply the use of drawings, pictures and clay forms that precede the carving process
- Discover how to apply your own creative idea to the medium of stone to progress to a finished piece

By the end of this course beginners will: gain basic knowledge of stone carving skills through producing work carved from stone. Please be aware that you may not complete your work in one term, especially if your piece is large and/or detailed. If you are an **Intermediate/advanced** level you will expand your knowledge and fine tune your carving skills.

About your tutor

Bobbie Fennick is a stonemason and carver with a background in science and fine art. Having completed a course in Architectural Stonemasonry at the Building Crafts College, London in 2001, she went on to work on many of the UK's iconic historical buildings including the Houses of Parliament, St. Paul's Cathedral and Brighton Royal Pavilion. In 2007 she set up her own practice, Bobbie Fennick Stoneworks, carrying out a wide variety of stone carving lettering, sculpture and restoration projects in the UK and Europe. In 2012, Bobbie decided to consolidate and extend her carving and lettering skills with a postgraduate course at City & Guilds of London Art School, completing in 2014.

Bobbie has just finished the last of four large relief carvings for Hackney's Haggerston West & Kingsland Redevelopment Project. Last year she worked with Nina Bilbey on statues of the Queen &

Duke of Edinburgh for Canterbury Cathedral and exhibited work at Lord Mayor's Mansion House and Sir Harold Hillier Gardens Sculpture Exhibition, Hampshire.

What level is the course and do I need any particular skills?

Stone carving (if done correctly) is achievable by adults of any age regardless of physical capability. In fact often the more delicate hands can achieve finer control of the chisel. This course is ideal for beginners, although intermediate/advanced level students are also welcome, as this course also builds on existing skills.

How will I be taught, and what feedback and support will I get?

Your experienced tutor will support you throughout the course in both group sessions and one-to-one support providing regular feedback, critique and constructive advice. Each course ends in a final round up session and should you wish for any specific feedback or support, please speak with your tutor at the start of your course.

When I've finished, what course can I do next?

There are a variety of courses available as short courses over the Easter and the Summer holidays, also a wide range of evening classes, such as creative sculpture, stone carving, ceramics, figure sculpture etc.

If you have more time available huge development can be made in your practice by attending one of our part time day classes in sculpture or the sculpture certificate programme. Please see all the options available on our web site.

Are there any other costs? What else should I bring each week?

Please note that there is an additional fee for initial purchase of stone, varying depending on the type of stone you wish to use.

This fee applies to students working on a piece of stone from a previous term as continuing students can progress with the stone they already have. New students must purchase a block of stone on the first evening. The tutor will advise which type of stone to buy. The cost is £35 or £40 depending on type of stone. Payment by cash or cheque in class only.

Safety - Steel Toe cap boots

Safety is priority. On this course you will be taught how to handle and carve stones safely, however stone is a heavy material and should be treated seriously. **You must purchase steel toe cap boots prior to the course.** They will protect your toes from falling objects. Cost is approximately £15 if purchased online or on ebay. Cost if purchased at general hardware store is approximately £40. The Academy will not accept responsibility for injuries sustained as a result of students not wearing appropriate safety gear.

Daily breakdown

Courses at the Art Academy offer a structured approach to ensure specific subjects, skills and methods are covered. Below is a daily breakdown of what will be covered. Bear in mind that these classes will move with the pace of the class so a degree of flexibility of what will be covered on

N.B. different carvings combined with different natural carving abilities can make the above plan vary.

Ideas of what you would like to carve

Ideas prior to the course are encouraged but not essential as it will be worked on in the first lesson. However any ideas you have and can bring with you will help you with the clay model. Ideas can be in the form of a sketch, printed pictures from books, magazines, internet etc. Students may also wish to bring in objects to give them ideas such as ornaments, flowers, shells and leaves.

Inspiration for your sculpture

Students may find it inspiring to visit galleries and museums (take your sketch book and sketch some of the figurative sculptures at the V+A), search the internet and browse in libraries.

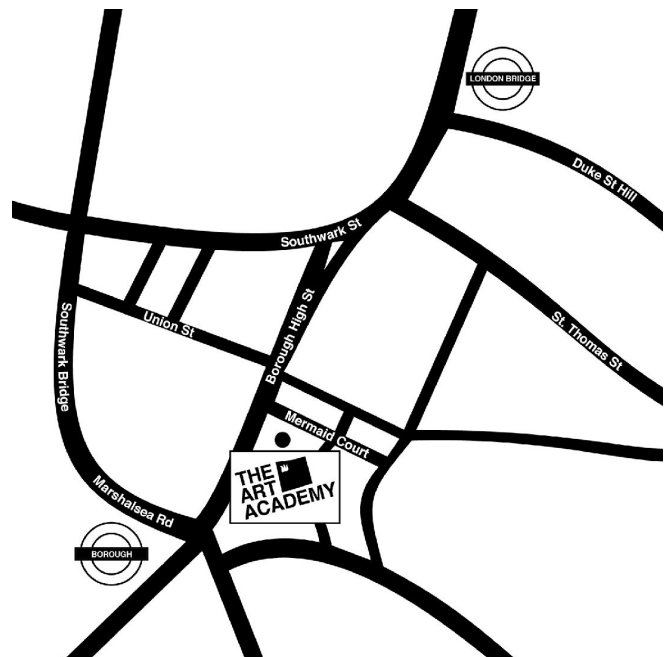
